The "Lite the Nite" event was held at Sage Park on Sunday, October 16. This event was put on through the Ryan T. Lee Foundation.

Chase's family, friends, teachers, and others gathered to celebrate his life. They wrote messages and drawings on paper bags, added lights, and then arranged the paper bags in a very large heart on the football field. The overhead lights were then turned off, and the heart was lit up. People were also able to write heartfelt letters that were then hung up on a tree, given to Chase's family.

The loss of Chase was very unexpected. The Berlin community was struck with the tragic news of his passing on the morning of August 20, 2022, right before the new school year.

Chase was an incoming 10th grader who was very excited for the start of his sophomore year.

"Chase was really looking forward to the start of the school year," said Brian Benigni, Berlin Schools Superintendent.

"Chase Money," as he was known, was a friend to many students here and had a great sense of humor, always

On September 8, 2022, Queen Elizabeth II peacefully passed away, marking the longest reign as a monarch in the history of the British Royal Family. Her 70 years on the throne proved that she was very well respected and hard-working.

Most students at BHS were informed on September 8, around the end of the school day. By the time the final bell rang, it was being talked about all throughout the halls, creating a conversational piece not just for students, but for staff as well.

"I was so shocked, I thought people were joking when they told me," says Julia Pikor, a freshman. Many other students have had this reaction as well; no one can say that they expected this incident to happen.

"I was in French class and the person behind me said 'the Queen died!' and I thought, 'No way," adds freshman Arden Singh. "I was so sad because the Queen was iconic."

Teachers had input on the tragedy as well. Social studies teacher, Ms. Jones,

said that Queen Elizabeth's "decades on the throne brought a sense of consistency to many, despite the rapid changes and significant challenges that the global community experienced throughout those years.

"However, monarchies also feel outdated and recall the injustices of imperialism. I am really curious to see if the Windsor line continues or if the passing of Queen Elizabeth II will mark the end of a centuries old tradition in Great Britain," Jones said.

Regarding her death, several protocols were put into action out of respect for the Queen. Foremost, the funeral plan known as 'Operation London Bridge' was put into place. This well thought out plan involved the official announcement of her death, the mourning period, and the specifics of her funeral. 'Day 0' of the procedure started the day of her death, when the Royal household informed the public.

Ten days later of mourning and the funeral day arrived. On September 19, the Queen's funeral took place with many world leaders in attendance.

Thor is having a midlife crisis, trying to figure out exactly who he is. When a tragic villain named Gorr begins slaughtering different gods from all across the



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New Schedule Extends Lunch to 30 Minutes

As students and staff arrive back to school for the new school year, there have been changes in regard to Berlin High School's schedule as it relates to the lunch block.

According to the Connecticut Board of Education, last May, the Connecticut General Assembly gathered to discuss granting teachers to "receive a minimum uninterrupted lunch of 30 minutes." They concluded teachers should have a longer lunch break.

Connecticut law now requires schools to grant teachers full 30 minute lunches, rather than just having a "duty free" lunch. This lunch is also required to be uninterrupted. These changes were placed into effect on July 1, 2022, coming into play for the 2022-2023 school year.

Although this law was meant for teachers, students at Berlin High have benefited as well. Not having enough time at lunch has been the top complaint for years, and now that students have finally been granted additional time, there has been positive feedback.

"I like 30 minute lunches because it gives us a brain break and we are able to refocus before going to our next class," Izabella Jamrozek, a sophomore at BHS said. "Plus, we have more time to eat and socialize."

For upperclassmen, seniors especially, the extra time is a welcoming change. Senior Alyssa O'Leary thinks having longer lunches is better than what BHS had in the past, especially during the Covid-19 pandemic.

"I think the worst part was time," O'Leary said. "I don't even know how I ate."

Here at Berlin High, administrators have had to take into account the 30minute lunch requirement when reconstructing the schedule.

As a result, passing time between classes is now four minutes instead of five, and the time between lunch waves has shortened. This has created a very small time period for custodial staff to clean tables and sweep floors. Because of this, please make sure to clean all your food up and avoid making a mess.

In spite of these new changes, classes at BHS have remained the same: four ninety minute periods a day.

What Work-Based Learning Means for Students

With Berlin High School welcoming new staff member, Ms. Hemming, some students may have questions regarding her brand new position as the Work-Based Learning Coordinator. Students have the opportunity of career exploration activities, which may include job shadowing, work based tours, and unpaid internships.

Ms. Hemming, who has a masters degree in school counseling, has worked

as a career coach in Hartford. She is not only a career coach, but rather, an extremely unique resource offered to high school students.



Hemming helps students break into the workforce and broaden their horizons through opportunities for

career-connected learning to help them discover their passion.

Some of these programs include a Certified Nurse's Assistant Certificate through Tunxis Community College, job shadowing, assisting students with finding employment, and hosting informational meetings between students and career professionals.

Hemming states that work-based learning skills first begin in a classroom, but are only complete once students are able to put those skills into practice. She also stresses the importance of using work-based learning to enhance students' feeling of purpose, passion, and pride.

If any students are trying to create a resume, or even just understand how a job application works, the school counseling department and Hemming are both resources to utilize. She is open to critiquing and providing feedback on students' existing portfolios and other job-related documents.

Parents can also become involved in helping individuals who are interested in a specific career by providing them with occupational data, training, and education regarding that career.

Using the QR code, parents can register basic information and connect with a student who needs assistance or has questions regarding a specific career.

Other resources that are encouraged by Ms. Hemming to use include Naviance, for

college and career research, and O*Net Online, a database from the Department of Labor that includes a multitude of jobs

available to help people better understand what resources are in demand. Looking out for occupational data, training, and education opportunities is key.


after forming the already cold dough, over time it would shrink because of the cold air. Therefore, we would have to go back and re-stretch it, which was very time consuming."
