




*The Storyteller*By Margo Vargas Llosa Review by Alejandro Arcila

This novel is a very good read. It is about a man, who is not given a name, who visits a picture gallery in Italy. He sees a photo of a small tribe of Peruvian Indians when he notices one of the members as an old college friend. He recognizes him because of the birthmark on his face. "Saul Zuratas had a dark birthmark, the color of wine dregs, that covered the entire right side of his face...The birthmark spared neither his ears nor his lips nor his nose...". The nameless man picks up on this and goes straight to Peru to try and touch base with his old pal.

Someone might want to read this book if they are feeling stressed, as it is a pretty good stress reliever. The author takes the reader into a world isolated from the way people live today. The reader has to have an open mind and allow the book to provide a completely different feel for how some people live today.

In this novel, Jack Logan is famous for his last name; his dad and brothers are sport stars at his high school, Foremont High. Even though Jack has the Logan last name, he is having a difficult time living up to that standard because he finds sports unnecessary, and he believes that studies mean everything in school. Things change when Jack's current principal, who agrees with Jack, has a heart attack and dies. The new principal steps in and makes a bold first move: he requires every student to play at least one sport a year for their school. With this new rule Jack has to find a sport that fits him and at the same time live up to his family's great legacy


This author effectively sets the mood in the first chapter of the book, which helps give a feel for what the rest of the book will be like. Also, even though it is a sport book, it doesn't overwhelm the reader with sports terms, but rather interests the reader with very clear explanations. This book is meant for everyone to read and enjoy, and is especially good for a reader who enjoys a fast moving plot. One of its focuses is on sports, but, at the same time, it also focuses on the characters. A number of characters mention how sports are unnecessary, for instance, "They can't do this to us... They can't make me play a sport I hate". The feud between the principal and many students then continues to drive the plot forward. Finally, one of the best parts about this book is how it isn't a part of a series, so the reader won't have to understand any background from previous books that could have been in a series.

After You By Jojo Moyes Review by Audrey Jankovich

After You takes the sympathetic reader through Louisa's (Lou's) journey of dealing with the loss of Will Traynor. After having a near death experience, she realizes how important it is to live her life as if each day could be her last. After visiting her parents, Lou is given an ultimatum: in order to stay in London she must go to a weekly focus group to help her deal with her grief. When a figure from Will's past shows up, the task becomes harder than it seemed at first glance, but finally things start going her way as she starts dating Sam, the doctor who had saved her life. Then, Sam gets seriously injured and Will's daughter disappears with no notice. We hope that Lou can get her life under control before it is too much for her to handle.

After You could be considered both realistic fiction and romance. The

story appeals to several audiences, and certainly the book is spontaneous and action packed. I recommend After You to any reader who likes a novel that keeps you on the edge of your seat. For example, in the beginning of the novel when Lou has a near death experience, Moyes writes, "My heart lurches a split second before my body follows...I am weightless, in the abyss of the night air...Crunch and then all is black." The suspense created throughout the book creates a well-developed plot. For instance, when Lu falls, she meets Sam whom she ends up dating later in the story. After she falls, she also is also forced to go home - where she has not wanted to go because that is the town where Will used to live. In order to fully understand Lu's background and past life, I suggest you first read the first book in the sequence, Me before You.




The RescueBy Nicholas Sparks Review by Grace Perkins

The fictional love story between Taylor McAden and Denise Holden in *The Rescue* will melt your heart. If you love romance, this novel will not disappoint you - it's a page turner. Denise Holden is a 29 year old single mom living in Edenton, North Carolina. Her son, Kyle, is four, and

experiences auditory processing problems. Kyle's processing problems prevent him from expressing himself and understanding other people. One night a big storm hits Edenton. Denise, with Kyle in the car, hits a giant tree. She wakes up after the accident and discovers that Kyle is missing. At this point, Taylor McAden gets involved. Taylor is a brave and intelligent firefighter, a contractor, and a carpenter. He rescues Kyle, who has run away from his injured mother into the storm.

It turns out that events in Taylor's history have left him to find it difficult to develop strong emotional attachments. YetThe love between Taylor and Denise will become reality after near death experiences, emotional situations, and Taylor's finally sharing the awful memory he has about his father's death. Taylor is left with two choices. Will he love Denise unconditionally as Denise loves him? Or will Taylor walk away because he's scared? This novel will attract readers who might enjoy discovering if the complicated relationship will work out.

"Eragon" is an exciting fantasy novel about a young farmer named Eragon who loves to hunt in the woods in a dangerous part of his land called the Spine, a long string of tall mountains. He hunts for enough food to sell, so his family can have a good life. It seems like his dream has come true when he discovers a large sapphire in the middle of the woods.
