
#### Library News By Ms. Fazzio

The Berlin students have been invited to attend the International Career DECA Conference in Anaheim, California to compete and to participate in leadership workshops.




# Random Acts of Kindness has a Plan! by Sania Khan

Next up: the year's final pep rally, set for April 26.




### The Lamp Shines On by Kara Boninsegna

No rink, no problem. The Berlin High Hockey Team has been one of the school's most successful since its inception nine years ago. Operating as a co-op with Newington High, Manchester High, and Cromwell High, the team has skated to a 127 - 69 - 7 record, winning four CCC Divisional Championships and two State Championships.

This past season, despite a weak start, the team went on to three wins in the final five games to once again qualify for state competition. As eleventh seed in the D III tournament, where they lost 4 -3 in an overtime first round thriller, the team acquitted itself well, showing a strong, never say die, effort.
