Connecticut's Principal of the Year

This year, Berlin's very own Francis Kennedy Jr., has won an honorable award for being the best principal in the state of Connecticut. Kennedy has served as principal of Berlin High School for 4 years. Prior to his arrival in Berlin, he had worked as a teacher, parent professional, and served as a principal for 15 years.

When inquired on some of his most pressing concerns, he said, "Trying to do our due diligence as an instructional team to make sure that the high school experience that the students have is a once in a lifetime experience that's irreplaceable and is always something they can look back on with pride and is in no way shortchanged by the building project that's going on around us...The most pressing issue is trying to keep that delicate balance between keeping the project moving forward so that it really is done for 2016, while somehow having the patience, the grace, and the clever strategizing to make sure that we can still deliver our curriculum in a meaningful way and give students an excellent high school experience." Berlin High School is currently undergoing intense renovations, and at the same time, must support the education of nearly 1000 students. The ability to maintain constructional progress with academic progress is something that Kennedy is recognized for.

Every step of the way, the principal of Berlin High School always felt that he had the entirety of the high school to thank for the immense progress made in improving the school with renovations and more academic success Mr. Kennedy said, "It is the students, faculty, staff, and stakeholders who helped me win this award. I think that if I were applying for that award and the school was not

successful, impressive, and wonderful, theres is no way this award would be bestowed upon me. Without the help of excellent kids and their families, without the excellent teaching staff who are pulling together to make this place great, it would not be possible for me to get this award. Therefore, this honor, this distinction, is one that is truly collective, and it honors all of us. I just happen to be the very fortunate representative to represent all that is great here at Berlin High School."

At the end of this year, Mr. Kennedy will be representing Berlin High School in the nation's capitol, Washington D.C. with a speech. He is one of three state educators of the year in recent years from Berlin High, the others being Mr. David Bosso and Msd. Carol Virostek, both Connecticut Teachers of the Year.



Habitat for Humanity Builds

Habitat for Humanity is an organization that helps those in need by creating a fleet of volunteers to work on houses; because of this free labor, the overall cost of the house for the future homeowner is lowered. Habitat for Humanity does not provide handouts. What the organization requires is that the future homeowner, along with volunteers, works on the house.

The Berlin High School Chapter of Habitat for Humanity this year has been run by: Megan Leavenworth (President), Stephanie Lesmes (Vice President), Sarah Hagen (Secretary), Mackenzie O'Connor (Treasurer), Kayla Maslowski, Melissa Stanton, Sarah Hoag and Sarah Ward (Committee Leaders). Throughout the year, the chapter has been fundraising to support the future of the club, and also to allow them to travel to Maryville, Tennessee to build houses. The fundraisers that were done included: bake sales; collecting donations at the past school plays/musicals, Walgreens and Stop and Shop; and running the Boo Grams and Candy Grams sales.

A group of 18 students and 3 teachers traveled down to Maryville during spring break. The students ranged in age from 16 to 18. The teachers accompanying them were Mrs. Wilkosz (Habitat Advisor), Mr. Munoz, and Ms. Portal. While they were there, they participated in numerous builds, and also helped out in the Habitat ReStore. The ReStore is a non-profit store that sells furniture and other home improvement items. The profits from these sales benefited the local affiliate of Habitat for Humanity and will help to buy the land and obtain the materials for the houses that are being built. The group worked an average of

5-6 hours for 5 days, rotating between working in the Habitat Restore and the construction site, both in Maryville. The trip ran from Saturday, eight days to Sunday, so the Berlin team dedicated their entire spring break to give back to those who need it most.
